FALLBROOK LIBRARY WINS ORCHID AWARD

The people have spoken.

The Fallbrook Library has won the coveted "People's Choice" Orchid award in the San Diego Architectural Foundation's annual "Orchid's and Onions" awards presentation highlighting good (and bad) building design.

A judge's panel picks most of the Orchids and Onions, but online voting determines the People's Choice award. After receiving multiple nominations, the Fallbrook Library received the most votes from a field of finalists.

"I'm not surprised the library won an architectural award based on popular voting," Board of Supervisors Chairman Bill Horn said. "The people of Fallbrook had so much input into this library's design. They're extremely proud of the welcoming, functional and attractive place it has become."

The brightly-colored library on the corner of South Mission Road and East Alvarado Street opened in January. The building is a celebration of local art, culture and ideas, with sculptures, lithographs, gates, and mosaics by local artists built into its structure. The library is an integral element of Fallbrook's community vision of having East Alvarado Street serve as an "arts corridor" and is rightfully situated near the Fallbrook Arts Center and School of Arts.

The library has received "multiple awards" which will be on display at the library at the first birthday celebration. A 3,500-square-foot area of the roof is landscaped with a colorful mosaic of succulents (which have been replanted), both eye-catching and eco-friendly, is one of its most visible "green" features.

With peaceful natural lighting, a "living room," area with fireplace, a shaded Poets' Patio, community spaces, a large and colorful children's area, homework



center, and a teen zone, the library's layout has drawn praise from patrons.

The Fallbrook Library was delivered by the design build team of C.W. Driver – Builders; Ferguson Pape Baldwin Architects – Architects of Record; and Manuel Oncina – Design Architect. The library design incorporated the ideas and needs expressed by the community and the Friends of the Fallbrook Library.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Fallbrook Friends.

Over the past several months there has been much discussion and concern over the lack of a flagpole in front of our beautiful new library. The great praise for the beauty and functionality of the library and the many awards bestowed on it did not alleviate the fact that here, in patriotic Fallbrook, the American flag did not wave over the library.

All that distress is happily about to be behind us! Thanks to the cooperative efforts of civic minded Jason Springston who spearheaded a grass roots movement to raise funds to assure that a flagpole grace the library grounds, the FoFL who collected and recorded the donations, and the county money provided by Supervisor Horn, the Fallbrook Library will have it's flag at last. Of course, the greatest thanks go to the many people and organizations whose generous contributions and efforts have made it all a reality.

The community had the final choice in the location of the flagpole, and when all votes were cast the choice was to erect it by the sign at the entrance to the library on Alvarado. The flag will be lighted at dusk so it will be seen and will fly proudly both day and night.

The flagpole and the flag are guite special. Last summer, even before all the funds were collected, Representative Darrell Isa presented the library with the gift of a beautiful, American-made, flag. This is the flag that will initially fly at the library. The county also elected to provide us with a high quality stainless steel pole which is currently under construction in Ohio. This choice of material assures that the flagpole will not only look good while it is new, but will continue to give us long term service.

The flagpole will be erected very soon, hopefully in about a month. The dedication ceremony will follow with celebration and respect, and the community is invited to share in that long awaited event. Please be sure that we will give you ample notice with publicity both at the library and Bottom Shelf Bookstore as well as in the media. Those of you who receive our e-mails will also receive personal notification.

This is an occasion for the entire community to be proud because it shows what can be accomplished when people work together toward a meaningful solution. The flag came late, yes, but it will take its rightful place at the Fallbrook Library and in the hearts of all its citizens.

FINE ART AT THE LIBRARY **"IGOR! PAINTINGS AND GRAPHIC WORKS BY IGOR KOUTSENKO**"

A one-man show featuring paintings, drawings, wood cuts, intaglio and monotype prints.

Igor Koutsenko was born in Evpatoria, a resort city on the Crimean Peninsula on the Black Sea. His father brought Igor to the Children's Art School in his hometown after his son demonstrated artistic ability at a young age. At age eleven, Koutsenko was accepted to the adult art studio directed by the acclaimed artist Zvyagintesev who encouraged his talent. Later Igor was educated at the Penza School of Art (class of E. lodynis) and received rigorous training in the old traditions of Russian realist art. While living in Moscow, he successfully used the Moscow art market to sell his works to Russian and foreign collectors. His experience in Moscow allowed him to fully realize himself as an independent artist.

Koutsenko immigrated to the United States in 1992 settling in Oklahoma City where he taught fine art at the University of Central Oklahoma. In 1995, he was granted permanent United States residentship as an alien of extraordinary abilities.

In 1998 Koutsenko visited Southern California and was attracted by its beautiful scenery and climate that reminded him of his boyhood surroundings in Crimea. Since moving to Southern California, he continues to

What is the Fine Free Friday Program?

Fine Free Friday is an "amnesty" day that encourages customers to bring back overdue items without penalty.

Fine Free Friday is a pilot program. Beginning December 1, 2011, the Fine Free Friday program changed. The following information explains the newly revised program.

Overdue SDCL-owned library materials are eligible to have their fines waived if the items are returned on the last Friday of the month following the item's due date. Items overdue longer than this will not be eligible for their fines to be waived on Fine Free Friday. Renew and save

Many San Diego County Library (SDCL) owned books can be renewed up to 50 times*!

Many SDCL owned DVDs and CDs can be renewed up to 20 times*! Renewing your library materials before the Due Date can save you on overdue fines. And with up to 50 renewals available for some SDCLowned books, you might begin to feel limitless!

* Items that are on hold for others and items that are Billed are not eligible for renewal. Also, non-County owned materials (special loans) are limited in the number of times they


